In academic writing paragraphs are used to help your reader follow your ideas and arguments easily. Each paragraph should be one distinct topic or 'big idea' which contributes to answering your essay question. Below are some examples of paragraph structure templates:

This demonstrates that not all paragraphs will be the same. However, if we look at the above structures, each one has the same core elements. Signposting and linking sentences at the start and end of the paragraph. Plus, the inclusion of evidence from the literature with some commentary from you.
